The Waste Plan forms part of Bolton's Local Development Framework (LDF) and has been produced following extensive public consultation. Monitoring measures are outlined in the Waste Plan.

The Waste Plan was considered by an independent Inspector as part of a Public Examination between February and November 2011. The Inspector's Report was published on 18th November 2011 and concluded that the Waste Plan was 'sound', subject to two soundness changes. The Report also endorsed other minor changes that the 10 Greater Manchester councils suggested. The adopted Waste Plan incorporates the binding recommendations of the Inspector.

Greater Manchester Joint Waste Development Plan Document

Adoption Statement

In accordance with the Town and Country Planning (Local Development) (England) Regulations 2004, as amended, notice is hereby given that Trafford Council adopted the Greater Manchester Joint Waste Development Plan Document (the 'Waste Plan'), and the consequential changes to Trafford's Proposals Map, on 1st April 2012.

The Waste Plan provides a spatial framework for sustainable waste management in Greater Manchester up to 2027, includes policies to guide future waste development and identifies sites and areas suitable for the location of waste facilities.

The Waste Plan was subject to examination by an independent Inspector appointed by the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government. The examination included hearing sessions in June, July and September 2011. The Inspector's Report was issued on the 4th November 2011 and concluded that the Waste Plan was 'sound', subject to a limited number of changes. This document can be viewed as set out below.

Any person aggrieved by the adoption of the Waste Plan may make an application to the High Court under Section 113 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 on the grounds that the document is not within the appropriate power and/or a procedural requirement has not been complied with. Any such application must be made within six weeks from 1st April 2012.

Availability of documents

The Waste Plan (including the consequential changes to Trafford's Proposals Map), the Inspector's Report, the Sustainability Appraisal Report, the Sustainability Appraisal Adoption Statement and this Adoption Statement are available for public inspection at all public libraries/Access Trafford offices in Trafford, during normal opening hours. ADOPTION STATEMENT – 1 APRIL 2012

Title

Waste Development Plan Document

Subject Matter

This Adoption Statement has been prepared in accordance with the Town and Country Planning (Local Development) (England) Regulations 2004 (as amended) and gives notice that Wigan Council has resolved to formally adopt its Waste Development Plan Document with effect from 1st April 2012.

The Waste Development Plan Document (the 'Waste Plan') identifies how Greater Manchester will deliver the spatial vision for waste development to 2027. The Waste Plan sets out policies to guide future waste development and identifies sites and areas suitable for the location of waste development across Greater Manchester to 2027. The Waste Plan allocates seven sites within Greater Manchester specifically for waste management uses, and identifies a further 26 areas which are considered suitable locations for a range of waste management uses. One site, three areas and one residual waste disposal site have been identified in Wigan Borough:

Site - W4 CA Site at Makerfield Way, Wigan.

Areas – W1a Miry Lane Employment Area, W8a Ince Moss Junction Sidings, Cemetery Road and W13a Martland Park, all in Wigan

Residual waste disposal site – W21 Whitehead Landfill, Astley

The Waste Plan production has been accompanied by a Sustainability Appraisal, which sets out the likely social, economic and environmental effects of the policies and proposals. The Waste Plan forms part of Wigan's Local Development Framework (LDF) and has been produced following extensive public consultation. Monitoring measures are outlined in the Waste Plan.

The Waste Plan was considered by an independent Inspector as part of a Public Examination between February and November 2011. The Inspector's Report was published on 18 November 2011 and concluded that the Waste Plan was 'sound', subject to two soundness changes. The Report also endorsed other minor changes that the councils suggested. The adopted Waste Plan incorporates the recommendations of the Inspector.

Any person aggrieved by the adoption of the Waste Plan may make an application to the High Court under Section 113 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 on the grounds that:

- (a) the document is not within the appropriate power;
- (b) a procedural requirement has not been complied with.

Any application must be made not later than the end of the period of six weeks of the date of adoption of the Waste Plan.

The ten Metropolitan boroughs of Greater Manchester. In Wigan it relates to the whole of the borough.
